sings the traditional folksongs of his native Britain, and plays banjo and concertina. He is well-known to NY Pinewoods audiences, having played at many of their concerts and weekends over the years. Though best known for his long-standing partnership with Tony Barrand, he also performs solo, with the nautical music trio Ye Mariners All, in duo with Lisa Preston, with Nowell Sing We Clear, and in the Broken String Band with George Ward.





Lisa Preston

is a multi-instrumentalist from the capital district of New York State who has played in duo with John Roberts on and off for 22 years. Before that she played keyboard in the area Irish band Heatherbreeze, and fiddle in the original line-up of the Broken String Band. She will be accompanying John on Celtic harp and fiddle.

George Ward

is a lifelong collector and performer of traditional songs who draws on the rural singing tradition of the American Northeast for his main inspiration. Ancient ballads migrant in the New World, songs of the rural home and hearth, songs of the lumber woods, the rivers and canals are central to his repertoire, which also includes songs of social movements, the Down-Rent Wars of nineteenth century New York, the American Revolution, and comic songs from a variety of traditions. George is also a noted songwriter.





Mark Gilston

has been performing traditional folk music for over thirty years. His vast repertoire encompasses songs and instrumentals from North America and most of Europe, particularly the British Isles, Scandinavia, and the Balkans. His performances are laced with humor and a wide base of eclectic knowledge. Mark, an award-winning mountain dulcimer player (first place, 2004 Oklahoma State Mountain Dulcimer Championship), also plays concertina, guitar, banjo, Bulgarian bagpipes, pennywhistle, ocarina, tambura, and others.

Erica Weiss

is our dance caller — and more. She teaches Cajun dancing and Balkan singing. Her steady, driving beat makes her guitarist of choice with a number of dance bands, including the well-known Grand Bois. We're very happy to welcome Erica back to a weekend.
