QUICKSTEP; Saturday, March 6th; 8 PM ☺

Lively fiddle tunes, folksongs and fancy footwork are featured in a concert from **John Kirk, Trish Miller, Mac Benford and Ed Lowman**. This versatile stringband from Upstate New York plays old-time music with twin fiddles, banjo, guitar, mandolin and bass. Dance is a regular part of their show, from step-dance to hambone. They have developed a diverse repertoire of original and old-time music rooted in the North Country. Some selections are sentimental, others are humorous and some are toe-tappin' barn burners.

John Kirk is best known for his great voice, and has always made his living as a musician. He calls dances, fiddles, and also plays mandolin, banjo and guitar. Several of his songs connect to the Adirondacks and North Country living. The Dixie Chicks recorded his song, *Long Road*. John teaches music at Bennington College in Vermont and is a dynamic emcee, clogger and jokester.

Trish Miller has been teaching and performing Appalachian clogging since 1981, and toured with the Green Grass Cloggers, from Asheville, NC. Trish calls square dances and plays banjo, lap dulcimer and guitar. She teaches banjo at Skidmore College, directs the dance stage at several festivals and gives workshops on North American folk dance in schools.

Mac Benford plays old-time banjo, sings and has been a mover and shaker in the revival of stringband music in America for over 30 years. He was a founding member of the Highwoods Stringband and the Backwoods Band, and now plays in a dynamic Ithaca, NY group called Up South. Mac and John were in the band The Woodshed Allstars, for over a decade. Mac is a treasure trove of sweet old tunes and songs, and has inspired many people to play old-time music.

Ed Lowman is a multi-instrumentalist and singer. Old-time and Cajun fiddling, bass,



The Folk Process

We make great music in our wonderful club, but that's not the only kind of fiddling around that goes on. Since Valentine's Day is in February, this month's column is devoted to celebrating romances kindled through the club. In other words, who met who where and when as well as whatever other intriguing details various individuals were willing to cough up.

RUTHIE INDEK and RAY KORONA first met at a music party at Patti Lee Parmalee's apartment. Ruthie writes, "We met again several months later at the 1980 Spring Weekend. Ray sat next to me in Sonja Savig's singing class and our attraction was solidified as we yelled 'hey' and 'ya' upside down. We have been together every since." In 1988, Ray wrote a song for Ruthie entitled "Tide of Love" about that fateful Spring Weekend.

ROSALIE and ALAN FRIEND's first encounter was at a singing party at Ruth Jacobson's house in August, 1970. At the party, Adele Harris, who was the club's social chairperson at the time, persuaded Rosalie to host another singing party. Alan attended and the rest is history. On October 24, 1971, they were married and their daughter, Julia, was born on May 4, 1983. Julia is currently attending college.

Jean Halpern introduced WAYNE PRICE to ANNE OHAYON at a Frankie Armstrong concert during the summer of 1982. Two of their early dates were weddings of Anne's friends. (Talk about foreshadowing!)
