#### A Review — "Manna" Shelley Posen By Joy Bennett

Many of you know Shelley from his incredible work with Finest Kind, or his shape-note work, or as the writer/composer of great songs such as "No More Fish, No Fishermen" or "Fa-Sol-La". A few years ago at the Old Songs Festival, Shelley surprised some of us in a workshop where he sang a song he wrote about the passing of time seen through the years at the Passover seder, "And We Sang Ha Lakhma Anya" ("this is the bread of affliction"). Those of us there were moved beyond tears, thinking of people gone from our lives and how we remember them, the joys and the sorrows. I remember talking with Shelley afterwards to share my feelings and to convince him to record that song. Shelley then sent me a tape of some of his other songs about Jewish customs & rituals, but he was somehow certain that there was no market for this. The fact that I had some small part in pushing, nudging and sometimes downright nagging Shelley to do this project (though I was only one of many in that regard) gives me great pleasure that he has indeed put out this stellar CD of songs that evoke the sadness, joy, humor, and tears of the many Jewish holidays, rituals & customs, and of life in general. That it is a wonderful mix of different styles of music (something for everyone) that, in my mind, could not have been done any better, is the icing on the cake, (er, matzoh?)

Manna actually means "what is it?" in Hebrew. It was bread from heaven that sustained the Israelites during their 40-year journey through the wilderness more than 3000 years ago.

In "Manna", Shelley has captured much of the Jewish spirit, seeing joy through sorrow, of course often aided by food. Most Jewish rituals center around food – the abundance or the lack of it and Shelley takes us through the holidays with food.

Many talented musicians join Shelley on this CD where Klezmer abounds. Klezmer, that joyous-sad, wonderfully bluesy Jewish soul music, is blissfully performed here by *Be*yond the Pale. But that's not all you'll find. Shelley has set "The Bal Shem's Soup" to Arthur Sullivan's (Gilbert & Sullivan) tune for "When I, good friends, was called to the bar". "Ram in the Thicket," Shelley's great gospel song about Abraham's near sacrifice of his son Isaac, gets a wonderful bass only accompaniment (played by George Koller) that takes me back to coffeehouses of the 60s where poets would recite against the background of the bass. The vibrations of Shelley's voice with the bass make the hair on the back of my neck stand up.

*"Homen- Homentashen"* has a vaudeville setting Shelley wrote with Eddie Cantor in mind. Shelley gives us lots of latkes with three songs in different styles about those tasty potato pancakes *"Put the Latkes on to Fry"*, done bluegrass style, *"My Mother's Latkes"* with a distinctive Mariachi band feel, and the *"La-Latke Song"* almost 40s style. (Didn't I say there was something for everyone?)

There's a chant (Jewish Rap?) about "*Rogelakh*" you can use to walk off all the pounds you'll be gaining if you eat all this wonderful food, or perhaps sing as you walk to your local bakery or to the Rogelakh man in front of 2 Broadway in Manhattan on Thursdays. So, what's left?

Shelley has his own version of the cherry with no stone, "Four More Kashas" which tells about a wine glass with no brim, a fish that cannot swim, a matzoh that cannot break and a thirst that cannot be slaked. "Ez Gezunt" (eat in good health) tells us that if Jews were meant to eat healthy the good Lord would have given us tofu, not salami, matzoh, pastrami, etc.

*"Light One Candle"* tells the Chanukah story, and reminds us that sometimes a little can go a long way. There's *"Sheyne Ponim"* or "beautiful face" – to understand that phrase in just about any culture, think of the elderly relative pinching your cheek as a child. You'll find a fun song about a Deli with no tongue on the menu where the ever-changing chorus is a bit of a "tongue-twister" to sing. Another, "*Azey Geyn Di Yoren*," reflects the passing of time and ends with a Yiddish pun on the title.

Their workshops on old time music and where the songs came from were fascinating. Pat Conte, of course, complemented everyone with his multi-faceted abilities. What! You weren't there? You missed a good one.

On the other hand, there was a sad aspect to the weekend since this was probably the last time we will be at Camp Freedman. We've been going there over the past 35 or so years and I'd like to pass on some of my personal comments. Certainly there have been problems some years and there are less than perfect aspects of the camp, but that would be true of any facility we have used. Over the past few years there have been fewer problems and our relations with the camp have been very good. The camp has made many physical improvements and the level of the accommodations has improved steadily – unfortunately the cost of the camp has risen commensurate with the improvements. People have been, justifiably, complaining about the high cost and attendance has dropped accordingly. However, the costs of running a camp are largely fixed and, in order to stay reasonably full, the camp is now requiring a much higher guaranteed minimum attendance. The new minimum, and our desire to lower the costs so that more can attend, make it impossible to continue at Camp Freedman. Both the camp and I are sorry to see the relationship end.

Through the hard work of our president, board members, and some club members, we have found several other locations which should be excellent for our weekends. Do join us on future weekends.

Shelley performs all the superb vocals on this CD (with 3 additional vocalists on "Rogelakh"), plays guitar and banjo, and has a host of other marvelous musicians from many different styles. Shelley provides a glossary, read back to front, for all of us who either don't know or have forgotten what these Hebrew and Yiddish words and phrases mean.

I love all the offerings on this CD. I can't get *Ram in the Thicket* out of my head, but the one that touches my heart still is *And We Sang Ha Lakhma Anya*. I think about all our friends who gather with family, and those of us whose friends are our family. Of the chairs, some empty, the air still filled with the memories of those who once filled them. Of those who come now to fill the once empty chairs. We find the strength to go on in the circle of life with all its sorrows and its joys.

Whatever your taste, this CD will satisfy. Like the old commercial "you don't have to be Jewish to love Levy's" (rye bread), neither do you to love this CD. Jewish ritual (and food) may have been the setting for this CD, but there is something here for all people who gather to celebrate life, often around food. For the celebration of life is what this CD is all about. And, whatever your musical taste, you will find on this CD a song or two (or three) you love. Shelly's superb singing and his arrangements of the varied instrumental backdrops are marvelous. That this CD has something for everyone, Jewish or not, makes it a wonderful gift for any person, especially if that person loves great music, or even just food.

This lively octogenarian, still going strong, is always fun to have around, a walking treasure house of songs that are humorous, or touching, and yes, sometimes outrageous. This album is chock full of very special songs. Some are old favorites, others are unfamiliar, but none are dull. And Faith delivers them with pizzazz! You can almost \*hear\* the twinkle in her eyes. Many other musicians chime in, quite effectively.

Included among the 18 selections -- the title song plus "Here's to Mother Nature" (by the Berrymans); Eric Idle's "Song of the Planets"; a couple by Mark Graham, "Their Brains Were Small and They Died" and "High and Lonesome"; "The Gasman Cometh" (Flanders and Swann); "The Kuglesburg Bank"; "Bury Me In My Overalls" by Malvina Reynolds; Lee Hayes' "Eternal Life"; naughty

CD/book Review JOANNE HAMMIL: "Rounds and Partner Songs" Vol. 1, CD and book; Vol. 2, CD and book



"Wonderful songs, great rounds," said Pete Seeger about this enthusiastic (and very talented) performer and composer. Early on, her prize-winning "Pizza Boogie" album was a big hit (Bob Sherman played ten of its songs on Woody's Children!), followed by another good one, "The World's Gonna Listen."

Joanne writes terrific rounds, and 53 of her best are included in these collections. Volume 1 includes the popular "A Question of Tempo"; beauties like "Dreams of Harmony" and "Dance With Me"; fun rounds like "Popcorn", "Breakfast", "Ecology Round", and "Mud"; elegant ones like "In the Bathtub" and "Canons Are Fun?"; thoughtful ones like "The Heart" and "Time's Soft Wisdom"; holiday rounds like "Candles, Candles"; amusing words

of wisdom, as the different generations try to communicate -- "You Don't Know How Hard It Is"; exciting African-style cyclical songs, "One Family" and "Hold On"; sardonic examples like "Constancy" and "You're Right"; and many others. The book and the CD booklet include useful information about singing rounds, arrangements, and more.

Volume 2 continues on with great rounds like "Rules", "Left, Right", the gorgeous "Kate's Full Moon Sing", "Happy Birthday Round" (her own version), "Toshi's Clam Chowder", "For Pete's Sake", "Hope", and on and on.

Some of the rounds are performed a capella, others are accompanied by a large variety of instruments, in wonderful arrangements. Joanne's singing is superb, and a long list of other singers, children and adults, some well-known names, are excellent as well.

These are "must have" items for rounds lovers (AND everyone else). If you're not yet a rounds lover, be warned! Listening to these CDs may turn you INTO one. The CDs do come with printed words.
